CHARTER

1. Committee's Official Designation

Plant Variety Protection Board

2. Authority

Section 7 of the Plant Variety Protection Act of 1970 (the Act) (7 U.S.C. 2327) requires the renewal of a Plant Variety Protection Board (the Board). Departmental Regulation 1042-53 renews the Board to provide advice to the Secretary of Agriculture concerning the adoption of rules and regulations to facilitate the proper administration of the Act and make advisory decisions on all appeals from the Plant Variety Protection Office. The Board is established in accordance with the provisions of the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA), as amended, 5 U.S.C. 10.

3. Objectives and Scope of Activities

The Plant Variety Protection Board advises the Secretary of Agriculture concerning the adoption of rules and regulations to facilitate the proper administration of the Plant Variety Protection Act and make advisory decisions on all appeals from the Plant Variety Protection Office. The Board also advises the Secretary on any matters under the Regulations and Rules of Practice and on all questions under Section 44 of the Act, "Public Interest in Wide Usage" (7 U.S.C. 2404).

4. Description of Duties

The duties of the Board are solely advisory. The Board advises the Secretary of Agriculture concerning adoption of rules and regulations to facilitate the proper administration of the Act and makes advisory decisions on all appeals from the Plant Variety Protection Office. The Board also advises the Secretary of Agriculture on all matters under the Regulations and Rules of Practice and on all questions under Section 44 of the Act, "Public Interest in Wide Usage"(7 U.S.C. 2404).

5. Agency or Official to Whom the Committee Reports

The Board will report to the Secretary of Agriculture through the Under Secretary for Marketing and Regulatory Programs.

6. Support

Support for the Committee is provided by AMS, Plant Variety Protection Office.

7. Estimated Annual Operating Costs and Staff Years

In the performance of their duties away from their homes or regular places of business, Committee members may be allowed reimbursement for travel expenses including per diem in lieu of subsistence, as authorized by 5 U.S.C. 5703. One full time equivalent (FTE) with 0.1 staff year is funded to manage the PVP Board at an approximate cost of \$15,000 including salary and benefits.

8. Designated Federal Officer

A permanent Federal employee is to be appointed in accordance with agency procedures and will serve as the Designated Federal Official (DFO). The DFO will approve the advisory committee's and subcommittees' meetings, prepare and approve all meeting agendas, attend all committee and subcommittee meetings, adjourn any meeting when the DFO determines adjournment to be in the public interest, and chair meetings when directed to do so by the official to whom the advisory committee reports.

9. Estimated Number and Frequency of Meetings

The Board meets as often as the Secretary of Agriculture deems necessary, typically one time per year.

11. Termination

In accordance with the Plant Variety Protection Act, the Board will continue indefinitely. The charter will be renewed every two years. This charter will be in effect for two (2) years from the filing date. After the initial two-year period, the charter may be renewed as authorized in accordance with Section 14 of FACA.

12. Membership and Designation

12a. This Committee will be fairly balanced in its membership in terms of the points of view represented and the functions to be performed. Steps will be taken to encourage fresh points of view, such as establishing staggered membership terms and limiting the

number of renewed memberships. An effort will be made to provide a balance of points of view from a range of agricultural interests, as well as to appoint members from multiple regions of the US. Efforts will be made to ensure that different commodity groups including agricultural, small grain, vegetable, fruit, ornamental, and tuber crops are represented by the membership.

12b. The Board consists of 14 members, representing farmers, seed industry, trade and professional associations, and public and private research institutions. Every effort will be made to ensure that the membership of the Board is balanced; nevertheless, USDA recognizes that committee membership is not static and may change, depending on the work of the committee. Each member will be appointed for a 2-year period, with no member appointed for more than three 2-year terms. The Board shall consist of individuals who are experts in various areas of varietal development. Of which, these members will serve in a Special Government Employee (SGE) capacity. Membership of the Board shall include farmer representation and shall be drawn approximately equally from the private or seed industry sector and from the sector of government or the public. The Secretary or the designee of the Secretary shall act as chairperson of the Board without voting rights except in the case of ties.

12c. The DFO will serve as the chairperson of the Board as designated in the PVP Act, 7 USC, Title 7, Chapter 57, Subchapter I, Part A, Section 2327.

12d. Ethics Statement

To maintain the highest levels of honesty, integrity and ethical conduct, no Committee or subcommittee member shall participate in any “specific party matters” (i.e., matters are narrowly focused and typically involve specific transactions between identified parties) such as a lease, license, permit, contract, claim, grant, agreement, or related litigation with the Department in which the member has a direct or indirect financial interest. This includes the requirement for Committee or Subcommittee members to immediately disclose to the DFO any specific party matter in which the member’s immediate family, relatives, business partners or employer would be directly seeking to financially benefit from the Committee’s recommendations.

All members will receive ethics training to identify and avoid any actions that would cause the public to question the integrity of the Committee’s advice and recommendations. Members who are appointed as “Representatives” are not subject to Federal ethics laws because such appointment allows them to represent the point(s) of view of a particular group, business sector or segment of the public.

Members appointed as “Special Government Employees” (SGEs) are considered intermittent Federal employees and are subject to Federal ethics laws. SGE’s are appointed due to their personal knowledge, academic scholarship, background or expertise. No SGE may participate in any activity in which the member has a prohibited financial interest. Appointees who are SGEs are required to complete and submit a Confidential Financial Disclosure Report (OGE-450 form) via the FDonline e-filing

database system. Upon request, USDA will assist SGEs in preparing these financial reports. To ensure the highest level of compliance with applicable ethical standards USDA will provide ethics training to SGEs on an annual basis. The provisions of these paragraphs are not meant to exhaustively cover all Federal ethics laws and do not affect any other statutory or regulatory obligations to which advisory committee members are subject.

12e. Equal Opportunity Statement

Equal opportunity practices, in line with USDA policies, will be followed in all membership appointments to the committee. To ensure that the recommendations of the committee have taken into account the needs of the diverse groups served by the Department, membership shall include, to the extent practicable, individuals with demonstrated ability to represent the many communities, identities, races, ethnicities, backgrounds, abilities, cultures, and beliefs of the American people, including underserved communities.

The USDA prohibits discrimination in all of its programs and activities on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, gender identity (including gender expression), sexual orientation, disability, age, marital status, family/parental status, political beliefs, income derived from a public assistance program, political beliefs, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity in any program or activity conducted or funded by USDA (not all bases apply to all programs).

13. Subcommittees

The USDA and the Agricultural Marketing Service has the authority to create subcommittees. Subcommittees must report back to the parent committee and must not provide advice or work products directly to the Agency.

14. Recordkeeping

The records of this Committee, formally and informally established subcommittees, or other subgroups of the committee, shall be handled in accordance with General Records Schedule (GRS) 6.2 or other approved agency records disposition schedule. These records shall be available for public inspection and copying, subject to the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. 552.
